PRE-CONFERENCE WORKSHOPS

Workshop 1: *Integrative Interventions With Four Types of Personality Disordered Clients: A Cognitive Appraisal Approach.* Richard L. Wessler, Pace University, New York; Sheenah Hankin Wessler, & Jonathan Stern, Cognitive Therapy Associates (U.S.A.).

Based in part on attachment theory research, Millon's approach to personality formation, and affect theory (e.g., Tornkins, Nathanson), Cognitive Appraisal Therapy (CAT) is an integrative approach to treatment with personality disordered clients which assumes the interdependence of the psychological modalities of affect, behavior and cognition, with affect seen as first among equals. The model assumes that excessive affect stemming from primary attachments, in particular shame, anger and self-pity, expressed or unexpressed, underlie the personality disorders. Maladaptive interpersonal patterns and beliefs are therefore seen as driven by and recreating these longstanding feelings. Thus, while this approach uses cognitive, behavioral and interpersonal interventions, it also employs emotional interventions to address emotional issues.

In this workshop, the theory and therapeutic model of CAT will be presented and applied to working with dependent, avoidant, narcissistic and histrionic clients. This will be followed by demonstrations by the presenters in raising, managing and modifying affect. Other technical innovations which will be demonstrated include the therapist's expressing anger and inducing guilt and shame to promote change, and teaching personality disordered parents to interact in a logical rather than an affect-driven way with their children.

Workshop 2: *Constructivist Contributions to Psychotherapy Integration.* Guillem Feixas, Professor of Psychotherapy at the University of Barcelona, Director of a three year master course entitled "Cognitive Social Therapy" based on constructivist epistemology, Barcelona (Spain).

Constructivism provides many useful insights and orientations in the different modalities of psychotherapy integration. In the area of technical eclecticism, guidelines for the selection of techniques in function of the types of client are presented. In the area of theoretical integration, several main proposals are reviewed. After describing the practical advantages of these contributions, the central part of the workshop is devoted to the identification of change mechanisms and their relationship to therapeutic techniques. Several case examples are presented to illustrate how different techniques may influence the construction process.

Workshop 3: *Cognitive Analytic Therapy - An Introductory Workshop.* Shakir Shyam Ansari, Consultant Psychiatrist for the Oxleas NHS Trust and a Senior Lecturer in Psychiatry at the United Medical and, Dental Schools of Guy's and St. Thomas' Hospitals (University of London), London (U.K.).

Cognitive Analytic Therapy is a time limited, integrated focused model of therapy incorporating ideas and methods derived from psychoanalysis, personal construct theory, cognitive-behavioral approaches, and developmental and cognitive psychology. After naming the sources of CAT and the context that led to its organic growth and development, its key features will be described. Using the Procedural Sequence Object Relations Model as its cornerstone, the theory and practice of Cognitive Analytic Therapy will be elaborated in the workshop. It is intended to clarify CAT principles in order to demonstrate the emergence of CAT as both a complete therapy that brings about change and a model for conceptualizing personality-based and interpersonal issues.

Workshop 4: *Integrative Group Psychotherapy.* Hector Fernandez-Alvarez, Professor of Psychotherapy and Professor at the Post Graduate Program at the Universidad de Belgrano. Invited professor in Universities in America and Europe. AIGLE. Buenos Aires (Argentina).

The workshop presents group psychotherapy as a privileged procedure, and the therapeutic group as an instrumental means to accomplish the general goals of psychotherapy: change processes which imply the transformation of the organization of personal experience by producing modifications in the matrix of meanings. The necessary conditions for the use of group psychotherapy will be developed in this workshop as well as the functioning of therapeutic groups, based on premises, rules and systems which regulate their conformation and the dynamics of the interaction within them. The application of theoretical principles specific to integrative groups will be demonstrated through the use of video tape.
